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Biographies



Ana Đorđević, PhD, is an assistant professor at the English Department of the Faculty of Philology, Belgrade University, where she teaches several Applied Linguistics and ELT Methodology courses. As a Chevening scholar, she completed a 9-month doctoral research programme at Oxford University. Since 2010 she has served as a speaking examiner for Cambridge ESOL exams, and, since 2017, as a YALS Association teaching inspector. Her academic interests include initial language teacher education and constructivist teaching methods.



Danica Jerotijević Tišma, PhD, is an associate professor at the Faculty of Philology and Arts, University of Kragujevac. While her professional expertise lies in the sound systems of English and Serbian, she has also dabbled in broader issues of applied linguistics and ELT. A strong believer in the idea that research and practice must stand united, she recently published a workbook *Focus on English Phonetics and Phonology: An Activity Book for Serbian EFL Students (2021)*, while *International Varieties of English: A Workbook for EFL Students* is currently in press.



Nina Stojanović has been an English teacher at Studio Oskar since 2005, where she has taught all kinds of students, from kindergarten to C1 exam preparation. She is a Faculty of Philology graduate with a Master's degree in Andragogy. Nina is an OPEN program alumna, having attended their Professional Development for Teacher Trainers program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of State and organised by Arizona State University.
