Presentation abstracts

Title	Abstract
The Power of Classroom Dynamics Nataša Janković	What makes foreign language learning effective – is it knowledge, skills, the quantity of content or the quality of engagement? Or is it all at once? Maybe our students don't know it yet, but we do – they will need English for life. This presentation explores what we, as teachers, can do to make our classrooms more dynamic spaces for natural language use. The key question is: How can rebalancing teacher–student and student–student interactions turn current and future generations' language potential into meaningful possibility? We shall attempt to answer this question together by discovering the power of classroom dynamics.
The Future of Education: Current Trends Beata Dudzińska	The future of language learning is being shaped by education reform, demographic change, new technologies and changing expectations from learners and parents. But what does this mean for private language schools, and how can they turn these changes into new opportunities? I will look at some of the key trends influencing the development of private language schools, using Poland and Mongolia as two very different examples. In Poland, education reform, demographic decline and increasing competition are making retention, differentiation and clear learning outcomes more important than ever. Mongolia offers a different perspective, showing how a growing education market and the increasing importance of English can create new opportunities for learners and language schools.
Motivating Learners & Teaching Soft Skills Through A.I. Nicky Koutalianou	Discover how artificial intelligence can transform the way you engage learners and build essential soft skills. This hands-on workshop explores practical AI tools and strategies to boost motivation, spark enthusiasm and make soft-skills training more interactive and effective — including how AI can connect you with the culture of the English language through fun, travel-inspired exercises. Walk away with actionable techniques you can apply immediately in your classroom.
Can grammar practice be fun for students? Alegra Nikolova-Ristovska	This workshop focuses on grammar practice with primary school students and ways to make it more fun for the students. The attendees will be presented with 7 activities that they can do with their students to practice grammar in a different, motivating and entertaining way. The attendees will also be able to get hands-on practice and do most of the activities during the workshop, gaining practical insight into these activities as well as additional ideas as to how some of the proposed activities can be used in other instances, adapted to students in the upper primary as well.
How to promote leadership skills in education? Marija Pejatović	What do <i>The Story of Ganesh</i>, chain diagrams, <i>The Two Sisters of Bali</i>, the Canteen Challenge and Simon Sinek have in common? At first glance, very little. In this practical session, I will connect them through engaging activities designed to spark creative thinking and meaningful discussion. Participants will explore ways to encourage critical thinking, problem-solving and decision-making in the classroom, while also fostering empathy, teamwork and social responsibility. These are the skills that help shape future leaders—and what better place to start developing them than in our classrooms?

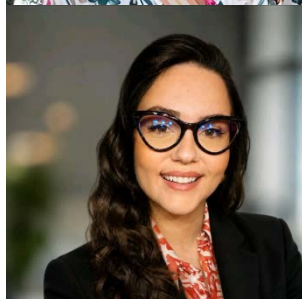
Biographies

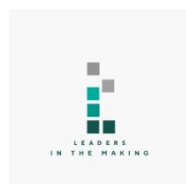
